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# **MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT**



#### **RESUMPTION OF OPERATIONS**

Since the last Annual General Meeting, we are well and truly back in the swing of club life. Our members are back to their active social lifestyle and enjoying their dining experience here. The Main Hall and the Badger Bar are ever-popular especially on weekends; the Hornbill Restaurant has been the venue of many weddings, birthday celebrations and other gatherings while Eagle Arms is drawing in a younger selection of members, thanks to the snooker and pool tables there. We have also seen a resumption of sporting and gaming activities as well as in sports coaching and lessons.

The Management Committee has also been pleased to be able to resume our club's "traditional" events with members – events such as the Members' Night, Senior Members' Appreciation Dinner, Family Day and building up to a crescendo with the Arabian Fantasy New Year Eve Gala. There were of course many other events and activities for the young and old going on throughout the year and I want to thank all the members who took part.

#### SINCE THE LAST ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

In the last Annual General Meeting, members voted to approve two new benefits for our most senior members. The new Club Rules were approved by the Registrar of Societies in November 2022 and are now part of the Constitution.

To date, 23 of our Ordinary Members aged 80 and older and having been a member for 50 years or more now enjoy their membership free of subscription. Over the course of 2023, 4 more Ordinary Members will enjoy this same benefit.

Members aged 75 and older and having at least 35 years of membership under their belt also have the option of transferring their membership to a Connected Person while still retaining Associate Member status and the privileges that come with it. This means that the membership can be transferred to a spouse, sibling, child or grandchild and the senior member would continue to be an Associate Member of that family member. Thus far, two senior members have or are in the process of transferring their membership to enjoy this benefit. If this is something that you are considering but still have questions, our Membership Department is ready to help.

From the last Annual General Meeting, members in attendance had made it quite clear that they thought that the surviving Associate Member of a senior member should also benefit from the years of membership of the deceased Ordinary Member, when taking over the Ordinary Membership. As was promised by the Management Committee in that AGM, we have reviewed the request from members and have now put forth a Motion to address it. I hope members will vote to approve it.

#### WHAT LIES AHEAD

My term as President has been truly challenging but I hope that members will understand that the Management Committee has tried its best under the trying circumstances of the Covid-19 pandemic to keep the Club running and accessible to members where and when possible. From a financial standpoint, the Club is relatively healthy and despite the disruption in our operations, we have managed to register surpluses in the last 2 years, albeit with assistance from the Government by way of wage subsidies in the 2021 and 2022 periods.

It has always been your Management Committee's belief that the Club's reserves are needed to help us get through a "rainy day", and it has also been a blessing to be able to count on our reserves to provide us the cash-flow during unexpected crises such as the Covid-19 pandemic. At the same time, continued improvements need to be made to the Club facilities for the benefit of our members and to ensure the continued appeal of our membership and as such, the other purpose of our reserves is to fund the future development of the Club. And so, with the cumulative built up reserves of RM9.1 million over the last decade, it bodes well for the future of our Club.

As our membership grows, we are aware that the Club also has to grow, not only to cater for the growth in numbers, but also to improve on our existing facilities and also to offer a more diverse selection of facilities. The House Member and his team have been working tirelessly to improve our facilities, but more excitedly, have been thinking up new ideas for the next phase of clubhouse development.

The planning for and implementation of the actual works of the club development will often run beyond the terms of the Management Committee. For example, planning for the renovations of the changing rooms, Eagle Arms, the Poolside Terrace, the Main Hall and the Members' Lounge started during my predecessor, Dato Richard Wee's term and were only completed during my term. Similarly, we are planning for the increase in the number of covered car parks for the convenience of our members, as well as the construction of a Sports Annexe with new badminton courts as well as to improve and update the Main Hall and other F & B outlets so as to improve the clubbing experience of our members.

The Club looks forward to sharing the ideas with members soon. Your feedback and participation in the process will be valuable and considered. At the end of it, we are enthused to see the new developments which will undoubtedly enhance your membership experience.

#### APPRECIATION

I sign off on my two terms as President with great optimism for the future of our Club. My sincere thanks to the Past Presidents Encik Shookry Gani, Dato Richard Wee and Mr. George Lo whom I have had the privilege of learning from. They have been a well of wisdom that I could always draw on.

During the time that I have served on their Management Committees until the completion of my term, we have managed to reconcile the divisions amongst our members, resolve the legal issues that we were faced with, improve and re-build the finances of our club, introduce changes to our Rules to strengthen governance, instill in the Management Committee and management a culture of prudent and responsible financial management, make strides in improving the service standards of our staff in addition to undertaking the improvements to our club facilities. These measures have ensured the continued appeal of our membership and an appreciation in the value of our membership to an all-time high at close to RM40,000 today and most importantly, we are the pre-eminent private members' club in Sarawak.

My fellow Management Committee members, all of the sub-committee members, our Honorary Legal Advisor Mr. Chew Pok Oi and Mr. Hudson Chua have all been invaluable and utterly dependable in the dispensing of their duties and responsibilities as well as rendering sound advice and to them, I would like to say "thank you".

I am very grateful for the many new lifelong friendships that I have made during my time serving in the Management Committee. To serve the members has been a great privilege, and I am grateful to all our members for your support throughout my term. Many of you have offered feedback on how the Club can be improved as well as attended our General Meetings to offer your views and I am grateful for your inputs.

I wish to also thank the General Manager, Mr Robert Brodie and, his team for their diligence in implementing the policy decisions of the Management Committee as well as to continuously strive to improve the Club for the benefit of our members. Thank you.

## **ESTABLISH QUORUM**

Mr. Christopher Tan (C157) (hereinafter referred to as the "Honorary Secretary") informed the Annual General Meeting (hereinafter referred to as the "Meeting") that the number of members who have registered as at 10.00am was 32 and confirmed that the requisite quorum under Rule 28.7 had been attained and therefore the Meeting could commence. The Honorary Secretary welcomed all members to the Meeting and extended his appreciation to the members for their attendance.

# OPENING

Before the Meeting proceeded, the Honorary Secretary reminded the members of the safety precautions relating to COVID-19 that were to be practised throughout the Meeting:-

- i. All attendees were required to wear a face mask throughout the entire proceeding of the Meeting;
- ii. All attendees were encouraged to practise social or physical distancing;
- iii. Members wishing to speak were to make their way to the nearest microphone. Members were reminded not to handle the microphone. A staff would assist to adjust the position of the microphone, if needed;
- iv. Members were reminded to continue wearing their masks while speaking; and
- v. After each speaker, the staff would replace the microphone cover with a fresh piece

The Honorary Secretary then proceeded to establish the ground rules for the conduct of the Meeting. He emphasized that:

- i. Members were advised to either switch off their mobile phones or to put them in silent mode. Members wishing to answer a call were to do so outside of the Meeting room;
- ii. Members were to conduct themselves with proper decorum throughout the Meeting;
- iii. Members were to observe proper time management;
- iv. Members were reminded to speak on-topic;
- v. Members must state their name and membership number before speaking; and
- vi. Members were to address the Chair when speaking, while the floor was to respect the speaker and make sure that he/she was not interrupted.

The Honorary Secretary then informed that under Rule 28.2, every Meeting in the Club shall be chaired by the President, and he proceeded to hand over the chair to the President.

## PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

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Mr. Melvin Wee Seng Lee (W008) (hereinafter referred to as the "President") welcomed all members attending the Meeting. Despite the COVID-19 situation, the President was grateful to members who were in attendance at the Meeting.

He proceeded to address the Meeting as follows:

"The last Annual General Meeting ("AGM") of the Sarawak Club was held in December, 2021 in view of the COVID-19 standard operating procedures ("SOPs") which prohibited the convening of the General Meeting earlier in the year in June as it was originally planned for. In view thereof, I had presented an updated and comprehensive report at the AGM and the period in review covered in this report is therefore relatively short.

#### **THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC**

In 2021, we saw advancement in the fight against COVID-19. Vaccination programs started and has been key as we head towards living with the virus. Throughout the year, we transitioned from the restrictive Movement Control Order to the National Recovery Phase. The varying protocols have been a challenge for the Club but we have remained steadfast in keeping compliant with the best interest of our members and staff at heart.

Gradually, more of our facilities reopened to members. As dining-in was reintroduced, the Club welcomed back members and their guests as well as our reciprocal members. It is heartening to see the return of the things as they were at the Club pre-pandemic. Most of the regulars at the tennis courts, squash courts, badminton courts and basketball court as well as the familiar faces playing pool, balut and bridge are back at the Club. The Main Hall, Badger Bar and the Poolside Terrace are also packed with members, especially during the weekends. We have also seen an increase in the number of patrons at the Hornbill Restaurant and Rajah Room, especially during the festive season such as the Chinese New Year period and the recent Ramadhan / Aidil Fitri period. I hope to see the return of more activity at the swimming pool, the gymnasium and the Eagle Arms in the months to come. The Entertainment Member and her team have also been organising many events as the SOPs were relaxed. This included the thrilling and ever-popular lion dance performance on the evening of Chap Goh Meh and there are many more events lined up. Last Friday was the Members' Night and it is good to see old crowds back.

#### **FINANCIAL POSITION**

Despite having to face the full brunt of the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2021, we managed to register a net surplus of RM464,347 for the Sarawak Club for the financial year ending 31.12.21 albeit with a contribution of RM477,600 from the Federal Government by way of the Wage Subsidy Scheme.

In the Annual General Meeting 2020, members passed several Motions to revise our Entrance Fees, Junior Conversion Fee, Transfer Fee and subscription for Absent Members. These changes have helped the Club weather the impact of the pandemic. Income derived from entrance fees, conversion fees and transfer fees was RM1.2mil in 2021 while Subscriptions contributed RM3.5mil.

The Management maintained tight control of its operating expenses, managing to reduce costs by 1% while still retaining our full complement of staff. Like before, we have included detailed accounts in this Annual Report.

#### **HEADWINDS AHEAD**

The financial impact of the COVID-19 pandemic is still being felt with the disruption in the supply chain caused by the lockdowns worldwide impacting the cost of goods and services.

The Sarawak Club is not immune from the impact of these cost increases and we had to reluctantly pass on part of the increase in costs by way of revision in the Food and Beverage pricing in April, 2022. It is noteworthy that prior to this, the last time Food and Beverage pricing was revised prior to this revision was in February 2019 and members have acknowledged that the pricing at our Food and Beverage outlets remain competitive.

The Government of Malaysia revised the minimum wage to RM1,500 per month with effect from May 1, 2022 and this will increase our salaries expense by at least RM170,000 per annum. The eventual increase in the salaries expense will be more as adjustments will also need to be made to salaries for staff at the levels higher than those earning the minimum wage in view of their seniority. As adjustments had not been made to the last few minimum wage review, there are distortions in the salary scale. It is important to ensure that our salaries are competitive in the labour market.

I have previously highlighted that the Club has funded our operational expenses, in large part, in the past from sales of memberships (until such sales ceased), Junior Member Conversion Fees and also Transfer Fees. With our Club's ordinary membership expected to reach the ordinary membership cap of 4,000 by 2024, we will be deprived of income from Junior Member Conversion Fees, which in the last 5 years is as follows:-

Unless the Sarawak Club relies on our accumulated funds to fund our operational deficit in the years to come, we will need to revise our membership cap so that we can continue to allow Junior Conversions or we will need to increase our monthly membership subscriptions. Funding of our operational deficit from the accumulated funds is unsustainable in the long run while raising the membership cap may not be a viable option due to perceived overcrowding at the Club.

## CONTINUED IMPROVEMENTS AT THE SARAWAK CLUB

With the lifting of the Movement Control Order, the Club was also able to resume in earnest the construction of our new lift and the new staircase at the sports annex. This has since been completed and is an added convenience for those with less mobility.

The automated car parking system has also been implemented to ensure the ease of access and exit for both our members and our guests. Hopefully, the new system will also ensure a reduction of traffic congestion at the Sarawak Club. Improvements to vehicular access to the Sarawak Club are also presently being studied by the Management Committee. With every new system, we anticipate there will always be system limitations etc.

The re-surfacing of the Tennis Courts No.3 and No.4 and the Basketball Court have also been completed and the Management Committee has also approved the replacement of the mats in the badminton courts.

We thank members for your understanding and bearing with us while the improvement works were being implemented.

#### MOTIONS

At this AGM, the Management Committee will be putting forward a few Motions for consideration by our members.

The first two Motions are to get the approval of members to replace and repair equipment at the clubhouse that have worn out. Motion No: AGM/2022/01 is in respect of the replacement of the commercial grade combination oven and Motion No. AGM/2022/02 is in respect of the repair of the wall partitions at the Hornbill Restaurant.

The remaining four Motions involve amendments to the Club Rules. Motion No: AGM/2022/03 pertains to the Club Rule with regards to the co-opting of an Ordinary Member or Honorary Life Member to fill in for any vacancy in the Management Committee.

Motion No: AGM/2022/04 involves the amendment to the Club Rules required as a result of the proposed abolition of the Resident, Outstation and Absent categories of membership such that no distinction be made as to the residency status of our Ordinary, Associate, Junior Members and Corporate Representatives. With the quantum of the membership subscriptions paid by Resident Ordinary Members and the Absent Ordinary Members equalising by 2023, the Management Committee believes that it is not necessary to maintain separate categories of Absent and Outstation Members. Detailed explanations will be presented later when the Motions are presented.

Motion No: AGM/2022/05 and Motion No: AGM/2022/06 are two Motions which are put forward by the Management Committee with the objective of recognising the contributions of our long standing and senior members of the Sarawak Club in terms of length of membership as well as age.

In Motion No: AGM/2022/05, the Management Committee proposes to waive the Monthly Subscriptions for Ordinary Members and their Associate Members where they have met certain criterion of eligibility including (1) having been Ordinary Members for a minimum of 50 continuous years and (2) having attained the age of 80 years. The Management Committee has been asked by members at previous AGMs to reward longstanding and senior members of the Sarawak Club. Having studied the various proposals to waive Monthly Subscriptions, the Management Committee had previously deemed the cost of such Monthly Subscriptions waivers to be too high and prohibitive.

Various ways of rewarding senior members have been introduced including the organising of the Senior Members' Appreciation Night, which used to be held once every 2 years but is now held annually for the 400 most senior members of the Sarawak Club in terms of length of membership, and their Associate Members. Various facilities have also been introduced in the Club with our senior members in mind including the Club drop-off area, the Members' Lounge and more recently the installation of the lift. We are trying to make the club house more elderly friendly.

The proposal in Motion No: AGM/2022/05 is another measure that the Management Committee is introducing to reward senior members. While some may feel that the criterion to be complied are rather onerous and limiting, the Management Committee has considered the financial impact of this proposal and feel that the financial impact is reasonable not just presently but also in the foreseeable future where life expectancy is expected to increase. We hope that the Motion

will be supported by members as a suitable reward and expression of appreciation for our very senior members.

In Motion No: AGM/2022/06, the Management Committee proposes to allow an Ordinary Member who has (1) been an Ordinary Member for a minimum of 30 continuous years and (2) attained the age of 75 years to transfer the Ordinary membership to a Connected Person of such Ordinary Member. Connected Person, under the Club Rules, is defined to include the child, spouse, grandchild or sibling of such Ordinary Member and to allow such transferor Ordinary member as well as his or her associate to become the Associate Members of the transferee Ordinary member. With Ordinary memberships running out as we reach our membership cap of 4,000, this proposal will allow members to keep the Club memberships within the family and at the same time to allow our senior members, who fulfil the above criterion, to remain as Associate members upon the transfer of their memberships to their Connected Persons. Again, the Management Committee has, in setting the criterion, studied the impact on our population of club members to ensure that we have the capacity to serve our members. We hope that the Motion will be supported by members as a suitable reward and expression of appreciation for our very senior members and balancing that with the interests of the Club as a whole.

## **BLENDING THE OLD WITH THE NEW**

The Management Committee was re-elected in the Annual General Meeting in 2021 and I am humbled that members have vested your trust in us to continue to lead the Club through this difficult period. We thanked Mr. Lai Lian Yee (L173), who did not seek re-election, and welcomed Mr. Dunstan Chan (C353) as the new Deputy President. It was also suggested in that Meeting that we should encourage new and younger members to get involved in the management of the Club and the Management Committee had responded with an open invitation to members to join the various sub-committees as a way of dipping their toes into Club management. Sadly, we received only one volunteer. Nevertheless, the Management Committees. I wish to thank you and welcome you aboard.

## **FINAL RESPECTS & RECOGNITION**

With a solemn heart, the Club lost a committed and dedicated Swimming Member on 5th March 2022 with the tragic passing of Tuan Haji Zain bin Abdullah (Z039). The late Tuan Haji Zain was actively involved in advancing swimming in the Club and was an integral member of the Management Committee. The Management Committee, on behalf of all the members and staff of The Sarawak Club, records our gratitude to the late Tuan Haji Zain and extends our deepest sympathies and condolences to his family.

In accordance with the Club Rules, the Management Committee has co-opted a member of the Swimming Sub-Committee, Mr. Tan Boon Hua (T745) to be the Swimming Member for the remainder of Tuan Haji Zain bin Abdullah's term until the next election of the Management Committee in 2023.

#### APPRECIATION

The day-to-day running of a members' Club of our size is a big responsibility. The Management Committee has been blessed with the support from the various sub-committee members and also from the dedicated Management team, led by our General Manager, Mr. Robert Brodie.

I wish to thank the Club's management team and all our staff for their tremendous effort and also to commend Chef Tay Soon Kheng for keeping the culinary offerings at the Club exciting.

Special mention has to be given to our Honorary Legal Advisor Mr. Chew Pok Oi (C111), Mr. Hudson Chua (L569-1), and our Immediate Past President Dato Richard Wee (W001) who have made themselves available for advice in their respective fields of expertise.

Finally, the biggest thanks goes to all our members who have continued to support the Club throughout this trying pandemic. We recognize that it has been a difficult period for everyone, and that your patronage here and timely settlement of your bills have allowed the Club to continue serving all our members and to keep all our staff in employment. I assure you that this Management Committee will do our utmost to ensure that our Club remains the pre-eminent members club around. Thank you."

The Honorary Secretary thanked the President for his address. He then invited the members to comment on the points raised in the President's address. There being no further questions by the members, the Honorary Secretary proceeded to the next Agenda for the Meeting.

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# TO CONFIRM MINUTES OF THE LAST ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD ON SUNDAY, 5 DECEMBER 2021

The Honorary Secretary requested for confirmation of the Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on Sunday, 05 December 2021, 10.00am in the Hornbill Restaurant with reference to pages 8 to 22 of the Annual Report 2021.

The Honorary Secretary stated that the Annual Report 2021 was distributed to all members a few weeks prior to the Meeting. He invited the members who were present at the last Annual General Meeting to raise any corrections or amendments in the Minutes of the Annual General Meeting 2021.

There being no further comments on the Minutes of the Annual General Meeting 2021, Dr. Timothy Hatch (H085) proposed that the Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on 05 December 2021 be confirmed. This was seconded by Ms Elizabeth Lee Chin San (L074). There being no objection, the Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on 05 December 2021 was thereby duly adopted by the Meeting.

# TO RECEIVE, CONSIDER AND APPROVE THE COMMITTEE'S REPORT AND BALANCE SHEET AND WORKING ACCOUNTS FOR THE PRECEDING FINANCIAL YEAR

The Honorary Secretary informed that the Committee's Report included the Honorary Secretary's report (pg. 23), Catering Member (pg. 58), Bar Member (pg. 59), Sports Member (pg. 60), Games Member (pg. 61), Swimming Member (pg. 62), Entertainment Member (pg. 63) and House Member's (pg. 64) reports. Also, The Independent Auditors' report (pgs. 25 - 27), Statement of Comprehensive Income (pg. 28), Statement of Financial Position (pg. 29), Statement of Changes in Fund Balance (pg. 30), Statement of Cash Flow (pg. 31) and Notes to the Financial Statements (pgs. 32 - 56) were in the Annual Report 2021 for members' scrutiny.

#### MINUTES OF ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Honorary Secretary informed that the detailed accounts for Restaurant (pg. 40), Bar (pg. 41), Club activities (pgs. 42 - 45), Club functions (pg. 46) and Scheduled of Other Operating Expenses (pg. 57) were also disclosed in the Annual Report 2021. As was practised in previous years' Annual General Meetings, the Honorary Secretary proposed for all the reports to be adopted collectively.

Honorary Secretary reported that the number of members who have registered as at 10.35am was 47.

Honorary Secretary invited the Members to raise questions or comment on the Reports and the Financial Statements as contained in the Annual Report.

Dr. Timothy Hatch (H085) queried on the availability of the Golf Resort account in the Annual Report. President stated that the Club does not report on the Golf Resort's accounts after the separation of the club, as The Sarawak Club is only the owner of the Golf Resort and the Club will only report on the financial contributions. Honorary Treasurer further stated that the yearly contribution from Samarahan Country Club (hereinafter referred as "SCC") is 5% of their gross income which makes up about RM174,000 for the financial year, on top of a yearly rental of RM12,000.

Dr. Timothy Hatch (H085) queried whether there was a provision in the leasing agreement to adjust the rental of the golf course. President commented that the rental income from the lease of the property is a fixed amount. There was a variable amount which was the revenue entitlement from SCC; 5% from their gross income and 15% from their nett annual income before tax. President invited Mr. Hudson Chua (L569-1) to answer Dr. Timothy Hatch's query. Mr. Hudson Chua (L569-1) agreed with President where the contributions consisted of a percentage of the revenue and nett income. There was a description on the income received from SCC on page 28 of the Annual Report.

Dr. Timothy Hatch (H085) reiterated whether the leasing income could be renegotiated for the rental of the 40-acres land. President recalled that during the negotiations of the separation, the intention was to ensure that SCC will be able to survive and to grow; where the rental and revenue entitlement paid to The Sarawak Club would be something SCC could afford. Also taken into consideration was that the founding members of the SCC were also the members of The Sarawak Club who have contributed to the development of the golf course. The separation would enable SCC to attract new members with a lower entrance fee without being burdened with the high Entrance Fee of The Sarawak Club. SCC had done well and the golf course was well maintained. On top of that, The Sarawak Club still received the rental and the revenue entitlement even during the pandemic times. There was a provision in the Memorandum of Agreement for a review of terms with regards to the Revenue Entitlement; which would only be after the first 20 years i.e. in 2044.

Dr. Timothy Hatch (H085) commented that the intention of the Management Committee back then was to get rid of the SCC. SCC was an asset which The Sarawak Club was responsible for with its contract with UNIMAS. Dr. Timothy Hatch (H085) further opined that the revenue was increasing and may be higher than The Sarawak Club's. While The Sarawak Club was stuck within such a small plot of land, SCC had land which can be expanded and developed. He urged the Management Committee to look into this and renegotiate with a better cohesive approach for the betterment of both clubs. There being no further questions by the members, the Honorary Secretary requested that the Meeting move to confirm the Committee's Reports collectively. The Honorary Secretary requested for a Proposer and a Seconder for all the Committee's Reports, the Balance Sheet and Working Accounts to be confirmed. This was proposed by Mr. George Ritchie (R054) and seconded by Ms Janie Wong Siew Ee (W222). Thus, all the Committee's Reports, the Balance Sheet Sheet and Working Accounts were duly adopted by the Members present.

At this juncture, President reported on the issues of the F&B operations. He stated that the recent delays in service had affected all members, including himself. He dined regularly in the Club and had received feedback from members with regards to the F&B issues, especially in recent months. There was a report by the Catering Member in the Annual Report. President added to Catering Member's report.

"The F&B facilities at the Club is undoubtedly the most popular facility at The Sarawak Club and it is usually near the top of the list when prospective members are asked "Why do you want to join the Sarawak Club?". Most of us also dine here or takeaway food from the Club on a regular basis.

We owe the success of our F&B Operations to the General Manager as well as a professional F&B team at The Sarawak Club, led by Chef Tay and Chef Mutalif in the Chinese and Western kitchens respectively and the F&B Manager Mikolden heading the service area.

There are few F&B outlets in Kuching and perhaps anywhere else that offers the vast array of dishes that we offer at The Sarawak Club. At the Main Hall, one can order popular hawker fares like Sarawak Laksa or Fried Tomato Noodles or if we prefer something fancy, Chicken Cordon Bleu or any of the culinary delights that the Hornbill Restaurant offers such as our famed Buttered Prawns.

At the Main Hall, the pricing of the dishes is competitive. Sarawak Laksa is priced at RM9.20 here and for its size, we may have to pay RM8 to RM10 at a coffee shop. It was the deliberate policy of the Management Committee to price the items affordably.

During the pandemic, we started a "drive-through" service for takeaways from our F&B outlets so we can continue to serve you when we cannot operate the F&B dine-ins. And again, we are probably the only establishment in Kuching that offers this service from a menu as extensive as ours. This is a service that is usually only available for fast-food. It is a service that is so popular that demand has not waned despite the resumption of dine-ins.

The competitive pricing of our F&B outlets and the "extra mile" service that we seek to provide to our members are deliberate decisions of our club's management and have made our F&B outlets extremely popular which led to us struggling to deliver when opening up. The overwhelming demand coupled with the kitchen capacity issues and the tight labour market in the COVID-19 endemic stage have led to less than desirable waiting periods for orders at our F&B outlets during peak periods.

The Management Committee and the Club's Management are working hard to overcome this problem of delay in service during peak periods and we sincerely wish to apologise to members for this inconvenience.

#### 1. F&B DEVELOPMENTS SINCE OPENING UP

Since the beginning of 2022, the pandemic-imposed restrictions slowly began to be relaxed. Banquets were permitted again albeit with capacity restrictions / physical distancing SOPs. We organised the CNY Eve reunion dinner, and there were a few small-scale banquets by members.

Physical distancing measures were still in place up to April 2022, when capacity restrictions were lifted. Since then, the Club's dining outlets have been consistently busy, especially during the weekends. Adding to it, the popularity of our takeaway service has carried over despite the resumption of dining ins.

## 2. EXPONENTIAL GROWTH IN BUSINESS FROM TAKEAWAYS AND RETURN OF DINE-INS

It is noteworthy that during the lockdown years of 2020 and 2021, Main Hall sales were largely from takeaways. Main Hall sales in 2021 have surprisingly surpassed sales in pre-pandemic 2019.

May 2022 has been a bumper month for the Club's F&B operations where we recorded +229% improvement. Of the RM733,000, 75% of sales were from the Main Hall and Hornbill Restaurant.

Sales at the Club have been overwhelmingly good. An analysis has been done and the Management Committee wanted to find out the cause of delays and how to better serve the members.

The increase of the sales are mainly from the Main Hall, whereas the sales from the Hornbill Restaurant has not recovered as banquets were only slowly coming back in. Banquets used to be the Club's main income earner but the recovery in sales was mainly coming from the Main Hall including the dine-ins and takeaway. The kitchen has been stretched by the large jump in business.

The COVID-19 lockdown started on 18.03.20. Sales in 2020 & 2021 were mostly contributed by takeaways. Takeaway sales are recorded under Main Hall.

#### <u>Main Hall</u>

Comparing Main Hall sales in the period JAN – APR, for the year 2019 vs 2021:-

Sales rose 7%, even though capacity restrictions were fully in effect in 2021. Our sales in 2021 were largely from takeaways.

Comparing Main Hall sales in the period JAN – APR, for years 2019 vs 2022:-

Sales rose 42% in spite of capacity restrictions for dine-ins in JAN & FEB 2022. When restrictions were lifted in APR 2022, dine-in levels picked up while takeaways continued to be popular and at a very high level.

#### Eagle Arms and Rajah Room

Business in the Eagle Arms and Rajah Room have returned to pre-pandemic levels.

#### Badger Bar and Poolside Terrace

Business in the Badger Bar plus the Poolside Terrace have also returned to pre-pandemic levels, when those two outlets are viewed as a collective. (NB: the Poolside Terrace had not yet opened in APR 2019)

#### Hornbill Restaurant

The Hornbill Restaurant was badly affected by the capacity restrictions.

#### Hornbill Restaurant: Casual vs Banquet

Comparing Hornbill Restaurant sales in the period JAN - APR, for the year 2019 vs 2022:-

Sales fell 53%. In 2019, banquets made up 30% of the sales, but only 10% of the sales in 2022. Sales were significantly affected by the ban on banquets of which the ban was only properly lifted in APR 2022. Casual dining in 2022 was at 61% of the levels in 2019, which corresponded with the 50% capacity restrictions.

Banquets are slowly picking up.

With the lifting of all capacity restrictions, we have seen a return of casual dine-ins and banquets being organised from May 2022. From the figures shown, the higher sales turnover was recorded and attributable to the increased sales of casual dine-ins and takeaways at the Main Hall despite a lower turnover from higher value Banquet sales and casual dine-ins at the Hornbill Restaurant. Hence, greater number of orders were served and portions prepared to register the higher turnover, taxing the capacity of our kitchens.

## 4. CHANGES IN THE STAFFING LEVELS IN KITCHEN AND SERVICE STAFF

During the lockdown periods, there were a number of staff from the F&B service team and to a lesser extent a few from the kitchen team, who resigned and who retired.

As part of the cost cutting measures, the vacancies were not replaced because it was not known for how long the restrictions imposed by the lockdown would extend. With the restricted capacity, there were adequate number of remaining staff to run the operations.

However, with the lifting of restrictions, demand for our food was overwhelming. Besides the physical outlets such as the Main Hall and Hornbill Restaurant, the volume of takeaways could be likened to opening a new outlet. The hiring of suitable replacements could not keep pace with the uptick in business. There was also a high rate of attrition among the new hires that were found, who could not cope with the work demands. The productivity levels of the new-hires are also not as high as the experienced staff, who left us.

There were two main problems and situations that the Management Committee faced and was trying to solve; (1) demand has just been overwhelming, even more than the pre-pandemic days and (2) supply has been affected by the capacity issues.

## 5. REMEDIAL MEASURES TAKEN TO MITIGATE PROBLEMS AND ONGOING SOLUTIONS TO RESOLVE PROBLEMS (IMMEDIATE & MEDIUM TERM)

The Management Committee has deliberated on this issue. Catering Member together with Honorary Secretary have met the Chefs and the General Manager to address the growing incidence of long delays for food. The identified problems and the solutions that are on trial are as follows:

#### MEDIUM TERM SOLUTIONS

The increase in capacity of the kitchens to meet demand is constrained by the limitations of the physical space of our kitchen. The Management Committee will identify measures to increase the physical space of the kitchen as well as to increase the capacity of the kitchen to meet the increased demand at the F&B outlets.".

President introduced Mr. Robert Brodie (General Manager), Chef Tay Soon Kheng(Executive Chef), Chef Mutalib (Western Chef), Mr. Mikolden Legem (F&B Manager), Encik Awangku Adzim (Manager on Duty) and Puan Nur Yasmin (Executive Trainer) to the members in the AGM.

Dr. Timothy Hatch (H085) queried whether the Club anticipated the takeaway orders to increase largely. President commented that the Management Committee did not expect the takeaway orders to have a lasting effect but lifestyle changes brought on by the pandemic and people enjoying the convenience of picking up their orders has cemented the popularity of the takeaway service. But, the focus had to be on the members dining in, which is why the Management Committee was limiting the orders for takeaway to 5.30pm so that the kitchen could focus on dine-ins during peak periods.

Mdm. Pauline Kon Suk Khim (K307) would like to add that the members really appreciate the F&B staff. Despite the busyness, the staff still served the members with a smile.

The Honorary Secretary thanked the President for the F&B report.

## TO ELECT AND APPOINT THE FOLLOWING FOR THE ENSUING YEAR

The Meeting proceeded to the appointment of the Auditors, the three (3) Officers for the purpose of Section 9(b) and a Public Officer for the purpose of Section 9(c) of the Societies Act 1966.

#### 6.1 THE AUDITORS

The current Auditor of The Sarawak Club was Crowe Malaysia, who were prepared to continue as the appointed Auditor. The MC recommended that Crowe Malaysia be re-appointed as the Auditor of The Sarawak Club for the ensuing year. The appointment was proposed by Mdm. Pauline Kon Suk Khim (K307) and seconded by Mr. Stanley Song Tin Kuet (S127). The Meeting adopted the proposal for the appointment of Crowe Malaysia as The Sarawak Club's Auditor for the ensuing year.

# 6.2 THREE (3) OFFICERS FOR THE PURPOSE OF SECTION 9(B) OF THE SOCIETIES ACT 1966

The President explained that, by convention, the persons appointed as the three Officers for the purpose of Section 9(b) of the Societies Act 1966 comprised of the President, the Honorary Secretary and the Honorary Treasurer. Therefore, the persons who would be appointed for the purpose of Section 9(b) were Mr. Melvin Wee Seng Lee (W008), Mr. Christopher Tan (C157) and Mr. Wilson Tan (T888). This was proposed by Mr. Jong Ah Jude (J008) and seconded by Mr. David Han Ming Chiang (H198), and adopted by the Meeting.

# 7 TO TRANSACT ANY OTHER BUSINESS OF WHICH DUE NOTICE HAD BEEN GIVEN OR WHICH IF RAISED WITHOUT DUE NOTICE, IS ADMITTED FOR DISCUSSION BY A MAJORITY OF MEMBERS PRESENT AND VOTING PROVIDED THAT NO MOTION FOR THE AMENDMENT OR REPEAL OF ANY EXISTING RULE OR THE MAKING OF ANY NEW RULE SHALL BE DISCUSSED UNLESS DUE NOTICE THEREOF SHALL HAVE BEEN GIVEN IN ACCORDANCE WITH RULE 32

The Honorary Secretary informed the Meeting that there were four motions being presented to members; proposed by the President, Mr. Melvin Wee (W008) and seconded by the Honorary Secretary, Mr. Christopher Tan (C157). Notice of the Motions were circulated with the Notice of AGM. The Honorary Secretary then invited the President to explain the Motions.

## 7.1 Motion No.: AGM/2022/01: To Purchase A Commercial Grade Combination Oven To Replace The Existing Oven That Was Beyond Repair, Costing RM95,000.00 Including Ancillary Charges

Motion No. AGM/2022/01 (Annexure 1) reads "To seek the approval from members to expend a sum of up to RM95,000.00 to purchase a commercial-grade combination oven to replace the obsolete oven which has broken down and is beyond repair. The replacement combination oven was quoted to cost RM90,582.50 plus ancillary charges by NKR Continental (M) Sdn. Bhd.".

The explanatory notes reads:

 The Management Committee seeks the approval from members to purchase a new commercial-grade combination oven to replace the obsolete oven which has broken down and was beyond repair. The Management has specifically requested the commercial grade combination oven of the same brand as the existing oven, which has proven reliability and which the kitchen team is familiar with its handling. Three quotations have been obtained. The cheapest quote was by NKR Continental (M) Sdn. Bhd. costing RM90,582.50 plus ancillary charges involving mainly delivery charges to Kuching.

President explained that the Club always tried to get an absolute quotation as it takes time for it to be approved. However, the supplier could not confirm the ancillary charges as the delivery charges were beyond their control.

- 2. The old oven came with the full rebuild of the kitchen in 2007 after the fire in 2006. It is fully depreciated. The combination oven is a crucial equipment in the kitchen, serving both the Western kitchen and the Chinese kitchen. The existing oven suffered a major breakdown just before Christmas 2021. As it is an obsolete model, only limited repair was possible and it has now lost critical functionality beyond roasting.
- 3. With the economy reopening, the combination oven is needed to help the kitchen meet the operational demands of day-to-day orders as well as for large scale banquets.
- 4. The Management recommended to purchase the combination oven from NKR Continental (M) Sdn. Bhd. because they have proven to be reliable with after sales support for servicing, maintenance and repairs of their supplied kitchen equipment.

President explained that NKR Continental (M) Sdn. Bhd. was the supplier of the combination oven that had been in use for the past 14 years. The kitchen was satisfied with their service and was recommending to the Management Committee for the acquisition of this oven. NKR Continental (M) Sdn. Bhd. was also among the cheapest quotation that we have obtained, as compared to two (2) other quotations.

President invited the members to raise questions or to comment on the Motion AGM/2022/01.

Mr. George Ritchie (R054) queried about the quotations obtained, whether they were brand specific or of different brands. President stated that two quotations received was of the brand Rational while the third supplier quoted for a Convotherm-branded oven at RM119,200.

There being no further comments, the Honorary Secretary proposed to proceed to vote on Motion No. AGM/2022/01. The vote was by a show of hands.

The result for **Motion No.: AGM/2022/01** was as follows:

The result for the vote on Motion No.: AGM/2022/01 was 41 votes in favour vs. 0 vote against. The President declared that the Motion No.: AGM/2022/01 was carried.

## 7.2 Motion No.: AGM/2022/02: To Repair The Hornbill Restaurant Wall Partitions And To Modify The Overhead Track System, Costing Rm131,600.00

Motion No. AGM/2022/02 (Annexure 2) reads "To seek the approval from members to expend a sum of up to RM131,600.00 to carry out repairs to the wall partitions and modification to the overhead track system in the Hornbill Restaurant. The specialized works are to be carried out by the specialist installers for the system and was quoted to cost RM131,600.00."

#### **EXPLANATORY NOTES TO THE MOTION**

- 1. The Management Committee seeks the approval from members to repair the existing "Megafold" wall partitions and to modify the overhead track system in the Hornbill Restaurant.
- 2. The existing partitions have been in use since the full rebuild of the Hornbill Restaurant in 2007 after the fire in 2006. It has fully depreciated.
- 3. The partitions have seen extensive use since 2007, and are integral movable fittings of the Hornbill Restaurant. The heavy partition pieces are moved into place with the overhead track system that was built into the ceiling. Over the 14 years of use, the track and bearing system have suffered wear and tear and have been repaired as necessary. It is a proprietary system and was installed by Titan (Sarawak) Sdn. Bhd., and has been serviced by the same.

4. The related repairs expenses incurred in the last 5 years is as follows:

- 5. There is also the anxiety of a sudden breakdown rendering the partitions unmovable and our staff unable to reconfigure the restaurant floor space for the banquet requirements. This would lead to loss of income in cancelled bookings, or even compensation for failing to deliver on a confirmed booking.
- 6. With the reopening of the local economy, we anticipate strong demand for banquets in the Hornbill Restaurant. A properly functioning wall partition system is necessary for the smooth running of our restaurant operations.
- 7. The Management proposes to repair the wear and tear components of the wall partitions, and to modify the track to be more durable and reliable. The upgraded track would also put less stress on the ball bearings which are expensive parts to replace.
- 8. The same partition systems have been installed by Titan (Sarawak) Sdn. Bhd. in the following venues:
  - Pullman Hotel, Kuching
  - Riverside Majestic Hotel, Kuching
  - Hilton Hotel, Kuching
  - UCSI Hotel, Kuching
  - Imperial Hotel, Kuching
  - Imperial Hotel, Miri
  - Shangri-La Restaurant in CityOne Mall, Kuching

The President invited the members to raise questions or to comment on the Motion AGM/2022/02.

Mdm. Pauline Kon Suk Khim (K307) queried whether the Club had obtained other quotations for the modification of the system. President explained that it is a proprietary system and Titan (Sarawak) Sdn. Bhd. was the only supplier with such system and with extensive experience working with the system.

Mr. George Ritchie (R054) sought to clarify if the works involved modifying or replacing the partitions. President reiterated that it was for the modification to the overhead track system which was built into the ceilings. Titan (Sarawak) Sdn. Bhd. is the main installer for the system and thus, we have not asked for another quotation as it is a proprietary system.

House Member added that this was partly a replacement and modification works, mainly to the tracking system, but that the partition panels would also need to be modified to work with the new system. A possible solution, as the member suggested was to replace the entire system,

but it will be costly. House Member stated that this was a more economical solution. If not, you will need to replace the track and the vertical panels. The current proposed solution will make it more operable over the next few years.

President also added that the partition panels were still functional and the Club did not want to incur unnecessary expenses on replacing what was still usable.

Dr. Timothy Hatch (H085) queried whether the system was powered by motor. President explained that it was not a motorized system. House Member added that you can see similar operated tracking system at most convention centers. At the moment, the wear and tear of the current system was creating a lot of friction issues and also safety issues to the staff. The tracking system had gotten stuck very often.

There being no comments, the Honorary Secretary proposed to proceed to vote on Motion No. AGM/2022/02. The vote was by a show of hands.

Motion No. AGM/2022/03 (Annexure 3) reads "To amend Club Rule 25.2 to clarify and specify that a co-opted Ordinary Member or Honorary Life Member who was filling in for any vacancy in the Management Committee other than the President, will serve for the remainder of the term until the next election in an Annual General Meeting.".

#### **EXPLANATORY NOTES TO THE MOTION**

- 1. In the AGM 2014, the members approved for the Management Committee to be elected biennially, before which the elections were held annually at the Annual General Meetings. Rule 25.2 was not amended to take into account of the biennial election.
- This proposed Rule change seeks to address this uncertainty and to clearly specify that any co-opted Management Committee member other than the position of the President would continue to hold the portfolio until the next election of the Management Committee, instead of up to the next Annual General Meeting in a non-election year.

The President invited the members to raise questions or to comment on the Motion AGM/2022/03.

Dr. Timothy Hatch (H085) commented that the wording of the rule covered any vacancy which could be a temporary leave of absence. In such a case, he wondered if a replacement would need to be co-opted till the next election of the Mangement Committee. A vacancy can be interpreted as a temporary vacancy or a permanent one. He hoped this can be clarified clearly by specifying in the Rules that this pertained to a permanent vacancy.

Mr. Chew Pok Oi (C111) (hereinafter referred to as Honorary Legal Advisor) commented that this Rule referred to a permanent vacancy. In our case here, it was due to the sudden passing of the Swimming Member. The Honorary Legal Advisor commented that under the provision of the Club Rules, the Management Committee could determine whether there was a vacancy and it can co-opt to fill the vacancy. The Honorary Legal Advisor opined that a leave of absence did not equate to a permanent vacancy in the Management Committee.

President agreed with Honorary Legal Advisor that the Management Committee has the discretion to interpret the Club Rules. President informed that comparing the current Club Rule 25.2 with the proposed Club Rule 25.2, the word "vacancy" remained unchanged. The Management Committee was only proposing to change the tenure that the co-opted member will hold office.

Mdm. Pauline Kon Suk Khim (K307) queried whether there was a provision in the Club Rule that stated the actual definition of a vacancy in the Management Committee. President commented that there was no provision that covers the definition of a vacancy. However, there were provisions in the Club Rule which provides that the Management Committee can interpret the Rules.

Deputy President added that there was no provision in the Club Rule that a Management Committee member can take a sabbatical. There was a provision in the Club Rules whereby a Management Committee member who failed to attend two consecutive Management Committee meetings will be deemed to have ceased to be a Management Committee member.

Honorary Legal Advisor added that on the issue of sabbatical, he made reference to Club Rule 25.8 that reads "Any member of the committee absenting himself from two consecutive committee meetings without explanation satisfactory to the Management Committee shall ceased as a Management Committee thereof.". There was still a discretion from the Management Committee whether to approve a sabbatical or absence of more than 2 consecutive meetings. The Management Committee can declare a vacancy or co-opt any member to fill in the vacancy.

There being no further comments, the Honorary Secretary proposed to proceed to vote on Motion No. AGM/2022/03. The vote was by a show of hands.

#### **EXPLANATORY NOTES TO THE MOTION**

- 1. In 2020's Annual General Meeting, Motion No.: AGM/2020/03 was voted by members with the intention to gradually raise the Absent Member subscription from RM30 per month to RM70 per month in 2023. Primarily, the basis was that all members are equal co-owners of the club and it was reasonable to expect all members to share the cost of running the Club. Further, most private clubs where the membership is transferable, do not have a category of "Absent Members".
- 2. From 2023, Absent Member monthly subscription will attain parity with Resident Members i.e. RM70. However, Absent Members have restricted privileges in terms of number of times that the member can use the club facilities. Additionally, the Absent Member has to pay for the subscription in advance for the whole calendar year based on the Club Rules.
- 3. Therefore, the category of the Absent Member is disadvantageous to members in every sense when compared to a Resident Member despite paying the same quantum of subscription. By extension of the same reasoning, the category of the Outstation Member is also redundant.

The President invited the members to raise questions or to comment on the Motion AGM/2022/04.

There being no comments, the Honorary Secretary proposed to proceed to vote on Motion No. AGM/2022/04. The vote was by a show of hands.

Motion No. AGM/2022/05 (Annexure 5) reads "To add new Club Rule 23.2.4 to waive subscription for Ordinary Members and their Associate Members where the Ordinary Members (1) have been Ordinary Members for a minimum of fifty (50) continuous years, and (2) have attained the age of eighty (80), and (3) have never been listed as a defaulter on payments to the Club, and (4) have never had the membership suspended for disciplinary reasons; that such qualified Ordinary Members shall be exempted from paying Ordinary Member monthly subscription and their Associate Member monthly subscription for as long as he remains an Ordinary Member.

## **EXPLANATORY NOTES TO THE MOTION**

- 1. At the Annual General Meeting in 2017, members have raised the prospect of the Club giving special recognition to the senior members of the Club. At the time, it had been put forth that all members who have attained the age of 65 could be rewarded with a 20% discount off their monthly subscription. However, the numbers were too many and the cost of such a reward scheme would be too costly and unsustainable in the long term. Since then, the Club has continued inviting the longest serving members to the Senior Members' Appreciation Dinners, which have been meaningful events for members to come together and to renew friendships. The Senior Members' Appreciation Dinners have been well received and will continue to be held.
- 2. The Management Committee wishes to acknowledge the most senior Ordinary Members of the Sarawak Club who have steadfastly contributed their service and subscription to the club over the decades of their membership, and who have been exemplary members.
- 3. In recognition of their longevity, the Management Committee proposes to waive the Ordinary Member monthly subscription of the Ordinary Members who fulfill all four of the following criteria:
  - i. Minimum of fifty (50) continuous years as an Ordinary Member; and
  - ii. Having attained the age of eighty (80), and
  - iii. Having never been listed as a defaulter on payments to the Club, and
  - iv. Having never had the membership suspended for disciplinary reasons
- 4. Although the Management Committee is averse to the waiving of subscription of any kind, it is of the opinion that such qualified members justify this extraordinary and meaningful recognition. The Management has forecasted the impact of the loss of subscription income arising from this waiver. Assuming year 2023 as the pioneer year of this special recognition, there would be 16 Ordinary Members who qualify. This translates to a waiver of subscription amounting to RM16,080 for the year 2023.
- 5. As the criterion that have been proposed are considerably limiting, the number of members who would qualify through the coming years is not expected to swell significantly from year to year.

The President invited the members to raise questions or to comment on the Motion AGM/2022/05.

Dr. Timothy Hatch (H085) commented that the criteria of a clean disciplinary record was excessive and punitive. He opined that even under common law, once a sentence had been served it was considered as absolved. As an example, he had been disciplined before but he has also contributed significantly towards the betterment of the Club, particularly with the Club's court case which the Club won, where he was an expert witness. He felt that it was small minded of the Management Committee to include this criteria which discounted all other meaningful contributions from the otherwise qualified senior member.

It was Honorary Legal Advisor's personal view that the point raised by Dr. Timothy Hatch was reasonable and ought to be taken into consideration.

Deputy President commented that if Dr. Timothy Hatch wanted to proceed with his suggestion, Deputy President advised that he put forward a motion to amend the proposed Motion by deleting that clause.

President stated that the current Motion had four (4) criterion:

- i. Minimum of fifty (50) continuous years as an Ordinary Member; and
- ii. Having attained the age of eighty (80), and
- iii. Having never been listed as a defaulter on payments to the Club, and
- iv. Having never had the membership suspended for disciplinary reasons

Mr. Robert Ian Alexander (A157) proposed to delete the fourth criteria which was "Having never had the membership suspended for disciplinary reasons" from the original Motion. This was seconded by Mr. Nigel Philip Burley (B113).

Mr. George Ritchie (R054) queried whether the AGM could make such changes in a Meeting. Deputy President commented that the floor can allow such amendments, provided it was agreed upon by the floor.

President clarified that the Management Committee had looked at all considerations and on what the club could afford. A sensitivity analysis was done as well. President recommended that the members should not tweak the criterion significantly as every tweak done would have a financial impact.

The President proposed to proceed to vote on the procedural change to delete criteria four (4) which was *"Having never had the membership suspended for disciplinary reasons"* from Motion No. AGM/2022/05. The vote was by a show of hands.

# **EXPLANATORY NOTES TO THE MOTION**

- 1. The Management Committee wishes to acknowledge the senior Ordinary Members of the Sarawak Club who have steadfastly contributed their service and subscription to the club over the decades of their membership.
- 2. The Management Committee also acknowledges that when the membership limit of 4,000 members is reached, there will not be any available memberships to assign to Junior Members for conversion into Ordinary Members. When this happens, there will be a significant loss of income of the collection of the conversion fees. In 2021, the collection of the conversion fees amounted to RM936,000, and in 2020 it was RM612,000.
- 3. The Management Committee proposes to introduce a new initiative to address the above two points, by establishing a new transfer policy for qualified senior Ordinary Members to specifically transfer their membership to a Connected Person (a sibling or child or grandchild) and to then allow the Transferor Member and his spouse (if any) to convert over to be Associate Members of the Transferee Member who is a Connected Person. Only Ordinary Members who fulfill both the following criterion shall qualify for this new transfer initiative:
  - i. Minimum of thirty (30) continuous years as an Ordinary Member; and
  - ii. Having attained the age of seventy five (75)
- 4. Such transfer of the Ordinary Membership to a Connected Person promotes the keeping of the membership within the family, and helps to cover for the lack of available memberships for Junior Members to convert to Ordinary Members.
- 5. The Transferor Member and his spouse (if any) will be allowed to convert over to be Associate Members of the Transferee Member upon the successful "Transfer" when the Transferee Member is elected. The converted Associate Member(s) can continue to enjoy the use of the club facilities sans voting rights.
- 6. When an elected Transferee Member later transfers the membership and ceases to be a member, all the Associate Member(s) associated to that Ordinary Membership shall also cease.
- 7. The number of Associate members are presently not limited under the Club's constitution.
- 8. The new transfer initiative could incentivize more senior members to transfer, helping to (1) increase Club's income from Transfer Fees, and (2) increase the Club's income from Associate Member subscription.
- 9. Assuming year 2023 as the pioneer year of this new transfer initiative, there will be 264 Ordinary Members who would qualify and benefit from this.

President explained that this was a proposed Rule change to allow members who already reached the age of 75 years and with 30 over years of continuous membership to transfer their membership to a Connected Person such as a sibling or child or grandchild. And after that transfer, he or she and his or her spouse can be Associate Members of their sibling or child or grandchild, which would allow them to continue having access to use the facilities in the club. It has been observed that there are such members who fit such

circumstances, and having reached a certain age, they do not use most of the club's facilities other than the Club's F&B offerings. There are also junior members who have missed out on their conversions. The changes being proposed here would allow these members to make greater use of the club's facilities.

The President invited the members to raise questions or to comment on the Motion AGM/2022/06.

Mdm. Kathleen Shewring Teo Whye Hue (S027) commented that her husband had been a member for over 50 years but had passed away in 2016. She then took over as the Ordinary member in 2017. She asked if under the proposed Motion, she would qualify for the proposed benefits. Otherwise, she hoped that the Management Committee would consider the continuity of membership, even for those spouses who inherited the membership after the death of the principal members.

President commented that this was one of the issues that the Management Committee deliberated on. However, the MC had concluded that the membership will only count from the time when a spouse took over the membership. Therefore, Mdm. Shewring would not be eligible based on the present wording of the Rule.

Datuk Sri Michael Manyin Ak Jawong (M128) queried about the transfer fee for such transfer of membership. President clarified that the transfer fee was unchanged at RM4,000 + SST.

Mr. Albert Poh Chai Kiong (P042) suggested to reduce the age of the criterion to 70 years instead of 75 years. President explained that lowering of the age criterion would mean a larger number of members qualifying for the change. The Management Committee was wary of overcrowding in the Club. As it was, the F&B outlets are regularly full and parking can also be difficult at times. The Management Committee has carried out a sensitivity analysis, and the total number of members eligible for conversion at age 75 and above was already 273. This meant that there was a possible transfer of 273 memberships and possibly additional 273 new Associate members. If the criterion age was lowered to 70 years of age, the number would rise to 477, which is more than 10% of the membership cap of 4000. This was only for FY2023, with the numbers growing in FY2024 and FY2025.

Referring back to Mdm. Kathleen Shewring Teo Whye Hue's (S027) earlier suggestion, President was open to consider it. However, President felt that it was too complicated to propose an amendment to the Rule at this AGM at the moment. President sought Honorary Legal Advisor's advice whether it would be difficult to come up with a supplementary motion and amend the rule now.

Datuk Sri Michael Manyin Ak Jawong (M128) opined that the Motion could not be amended at this point of time as a notice needs to be given. He suggested that the Meeting concentrate on the current motion and to agree or otherwise.

Honorary Legal Advisor commented that the important consideration was the financial consideration that the Management Committee had taken into account when this Motion was drafted. If the Management Committee amended it, the financial implication may be very different. He opined that it would be difficult to allow amendment to this existing Motion.

President thanked Honorary Legal Advisor for his comment, and proposed that the Meeting proceed to vote on this Motion. The Management Committee can relook into Mdm. Shewring's suggestions with particular attention on its impact on the capacity and the financial impact for such changes. If need be, the Management Committee will propose a Rule change again in the next AGM, provided the Motion was passed.

Honorary Legal Advisor added that it was clear that based on the current wording, the Associate Member cannot inherit the years of membership unless an amendment was done to the Rule. He commented that the Management Committee could suggest for a change in the next AGM for a special provision for such a situation.

Mr. Robert Ian Alexander (A157) stated that the discussion should be properly recorded in the AGM that the Management Committee will come back with a proposal for special consideration for such a situation. He also suggested that the Mdm. Shewring should withdraw the proposal from this AGM. President commented that there was no need for the proposal to be withdrawn as the procedural motion to amend this Motion has not been put up for voting and the MC's proposed motion can be put to a vote, as there were members who can benefit from the proposed Rule change. The Management Committee can propose to expand the scope of the eligibility criterion in the next AGM.

The Meeting then proceeded to vote on the amended Motion No. AGM/2022/06. The vote was by a show of hands.

President stated that if there were any motions to be brought up in the AGM, it has to be approved for discussion by the Meeting. President commented that he believed Dr. Timothy Hatch (H085) had some comments that he wishes to bring up on the election. President invited Dr. Timothy Hatch (H085) to speak further on this.

Dr. Timothy Hatch (H085) stated that he was unhappy with the previous year's voting for the Management Committee. The Management Committee members were nominating each other which he found to be an unhealthy practice. Also, the members did not get a full explanation before the AGM that Mr. Lai Lian Yee (L173) was stepping aside as the Deputy President i.e. that there would be a vacancy to fill in the elections. He suggested that in future elections, the incumbent Management Committee could inform members of who would be standing for each portfolio. Also, he advised that it would be better for the Management Committee members to get other members to nominate them instead of its own committee members.

President stated that the Management Committee members could only serve two consecutive terms in the same role. At the last election, the committee members were being nominated for the second term without a change in portfolio. The exception being Mr. Lai Lian Yee, former Deputy President, whose health did not allow him to continue as the Management Committee headed towards the election. Thus, there was a vacancy. There were other candidates who considered challenging but in the end decided against it.

The procedure of the Club has been to announce that there would be an election and that members can nominate whoever they wished to. In regards to the incumbent Management Committee announcing whether they will re-stand for election, it was not specified as a requirement in the Rules. However, President took note of Dr. Timothy Hatch's suggestion. If needed, a Rule change could be proposed.

Dr. Timothy Hatch (H085) queried whether there was a maximum to how long a committee member can stay on in the Management Committee. President replied that there was no restriction in an absolute number of years, only that it would not be more than two consecutive terms in the same role.

President reiterated that after the AGM, the Management Committee will gather all the comments that members have given and all the feedback that required the attention of the Management Committee will be discussed and worked on.

As an aside, Dr. Timothy Hatch (H085) also congratulated the General Manager, Mr. Robert Brodie, who was seen helping out his other staff on the floor. He set a good example to the rest of the staff.

# 9 CLOSING

President recorded his appreciation to the members for attending this Meeting. He extended his appreciation to Mr. Chew Pok Oi (C111), the Honorary Legal Advisor for his legal advice in the Meeting, Mr. Hudson Chua (L569-1) and the external auditors from Crowe Malaysia, the General Manager and the staff for the preparations of and organizing of the Meeting by ensuring that the SOPs were complied with.

The Meeting was adjourned at 12.55pm.

# TO PURCHASE A COMMERCIAL GRADE COMBINATION OVEN TO REPLACE THE EXISTING OVEN THAT WAS BEYOND REPAIR, COSTING RM95,000.00 INCLUDING ANCILLARY CHARGES

To seek the approval from members to expend a sum of up to RM95,000.00 to purchase a commercial-grade combination oven to replace the obsolete oven which has broken down and is beyond repair. The replacement combination oven was quoted to cost RM90,582.50 plus ancillary charges by NKR Continental (M) Sdn. Bhd.

## **EXPLANATORY NOTES TO THE MOTION**

- The Management Committee seeks the approval from members to purchase a new commercial-grade combination oven to replace the obsolete oven which has broken down and was beyond repair. The Management has specifically requested the commercial grade combination oven of the same brand as the existing oven, which has proven reliability and which the kitchen team is familiar with its handling. Three quotations have been obtained. The cheapest quote was by NKR Continental (M) Sdn. Bhd. costing RM90,582.50 plus ancillary charges involving mainly delivery charges to Kuching.
- 2. The old oven came with the full rebuild of the kitchen in 2007 after the fire in 2006. It is fully depreciated. The combination oven is a crucial equipment in the kitchen, serving both the Western kitchen and the Chinese kitchen. The existing oven suffered a major breakdown just before Christmas 2021. As it is an obsolete model, only limited repair was possible and it has now lost critical functionality beyond roasting.
- 3. With the economy reopening, the combination oven is needed to help the kitchen meet the operational demands of day-to-day orders as well as for large scale banquets.
- The Management recommended to purchase the combination oven from NKR Continental (M) Sdn. Bhd. because they have proven to be reliable with after sales support for servicing, maintenance and repairs of their supplied kitchen equipment.

# TO REPAIR THE HORNBILL RESTAURANT WALL PARTITIONS AND TO MODIFY THE OVERHEAD TRACK SYSTEM, COSTING RM131,600.00

To seek the approval from members to expend a sum of up to RM131,600.00 to carry out repairs to the wall partitions and modification to the overhead track system in the Hornbill Restaurant. The specialized works are to be carried out by the specialist installers for the system and was quoted to cost RM131,600.00.

# **EXPLANATORY NOTES TO THE MOTION**

- 1. The Management Committee seeks the approval from members to repair the existing "Megafold" wall partitions and to modify the overhead track system in the Hornbill Restaurant.
- 2. The existing partitions have been in use since the full rebuild of the Hornbill Restaurant in 2007 after the fire in 2006. It has fully depreciated.
- 3. The partitions have seen extensive use since 2007, and are integral movable fittings of the Hornbill Restaurant. The heavy partition pieces are moved into place with the overhead track system that was built into the ceiling. Over the 14 years of use, the track and bearing system have suffered wear and tear and have been repaired as necessary. It is a proprietary system and was installed by Titan (Sarawak) Sdn. Bhd., and has been serviced by the same.

4. The related repairs expenses incurred in the last 5 years is as follows:

- 5. There is also the anxiety of a sudden breakdown rendering the partitions unmovable and our staff unable to reconfigure the restaurant floor space for the banquet requirements. This would lead to loss of income in cancelled bookings, or even compensation for failing to deliver on a confirmed booking.
- 6. With the reopening of the local economy, we anticipate strong demand for banquets in the Hornbill Restaurant. A properly functioning wall partition system is necessary for the smooth running of our restaurant operations.

- 7. The Management proposes to repair the wear and tear components of the wall partitions, and to modify the track to be more durable and reliable. The upgraded track would also put less stress on the ball bearings which are expensive parts to replace.
- 8. The same partition systems have been installed by Titan (Sarawak) Sdn. Bhd. in the following venues:

# **EXPLANATORY NOTES TO THE MOTION**

- In 2020's Annual General Meeting, Motion No.: AGM/2020/03 was voted by members with the intention to gradually raise the Absent Member subscription from RM30 per month to RM70 per month in 2023. Primarily, the basis was that all members are equal co-owners of the club and it was reasonable to expect all members to share the cost of running the Club. Further, most private clubs where the membership is transferable, do not have a category of "Absent Members".
- 2. From 2023, Absent Member monthly subscription will attain parity with Resident Members i.e. RM70. However, Absent Members have restricted privileges in terms of number of times that the member can use the club facilities. Additionally, the Absent Member has to pay for the subscription in advance for the whole calendar year based on the Club Rules.
- 3. Therefore, the category of the Absent Member is disadvantageous to members in every sense when compared to a Resident Member despite paying the same quantum of subscription. By extension of the same reasoning, the category of the Outstation Member is also redundant.

### **EXPLANATORY NOTES TO THE MOTION**

1. At the Annual General Meeting in 2017, members have raised the prospect of the Club giving special recognition to the senior members of the Club. At the time, it had been put forth that all members who have attained the age of 65 could be rewarded with a 20% discount off their monthly subscription. However, the numbers were too many and the cost of such a reward scheme would be too costly and unsustainable in the long term. Since then, the Club has continued inviting the longest serving members to the Senior Members' Appreciation Dinners, which have been meaningful events for members to come together and

to renew friendships. The Senior Members' Appreciation Dinners have been well received and will continue to be held.

- The Management Committee wishes to acknowledge the most senior Ordinary Members of the Sarawak Club who have steadfastly contributed their service and subscription to the club over the decades of their membership, and who have been exemplary members.
- 3. In recognition of their longevity, the Management Committee proposes to waive the Ordinary Member monthly subscription of the Ordinary Members who fulfill all four of the following criteria:
  - i. Minimum of fifty (50) continuous years as an Ordinary Member; and
  - ii. Having attained the age of eighty (80), and
  - iii. Having never been listed as a defaulter on payments to the Club, and
  - iv. Having never had the membership suspended for disciplinary reasons
- 4. Although the Management Committee is averse to the waiving of subscription of any kind, it is of the opinion that such qualified members justify this extraordinary and meaningful recognition. The Management has forecasted the impact of the loss of subscription income arising from this waiver. Assuming year 2023 as the pioneer year of this special recognition, there would be 16 Ordinary Members who qualify. This translates to a waiver of subscription amounting to RM16,080 for the year 2023.
- 5. As the criterion that have been proposed are considerably limiting, the number of members who would qualify through the coming years is not expected to swell significantly from year to year.

## **EXPLANATORY NOTES TO THE MOTION**

- 1. The Management Committee wishes to acknowledge the senior Ordinary Members of the Sarawak Club who have steadfastly contributed their service and subscription to the club over the decades of their membership.
- 2. The Management Committee also acknowledges that when the membership limit of 4,000 members is reached, there will not be any available memberships to assign to Junior Members for conversion into Ordinary Members. When this happens, there will be a significant loss of income of the collection of the conversion fees. In 2021, the collection of the conversion fees amounted to RM936,000, and in 2020 it was RM612,000.
- 3. The Management Committee proposes to introduce a new initiative to address the above two points, by establishing a new transfer policy for qualified senior Ordinary Members to specifically transfer their membership to a Connected

Person (a sibling or child or grandchild) - and to then allow the Transferor Member and his spouse (if any) to convert over to be Associate Members of the Transferee Member who is a Connected Person. Only Ordinary Members who fulfill both the following criterion shall qualify for this new transfer initiative:

- i. Minimum of thirty (30) continuous years as an Ordinary Member; and
- ii. Having attained the age of seventy five (75)
- 4. Such transfer of the Ordinary Membership to a Connected Person promotes the keeping of the membership within the family, and helps to cover for the lack of available memberships for Junior Members to convert to Ordinary Members.
- 5. The Transferor Member and his spouse (if any) will be allowed to convert over to be Associate Members of the Transferee Member upon the successful "Transfer" when the Transferee Member is elected. The converted Associate Member(s) can continue to enjoy the use of the club facilities *sans* voting rights.
- 6. When an elected Transferee Member later transfers the membership and ceases to be a member, all the Associate Member(s) associated to that Ordinary Membership shall also cease.
- 7. The number of Associate members are presently not limited under the Club's constitution.
- 8. The new transfer initiative could incentivize more senior members to transfer, helping to (1) increase Club's income from Transfer Fees, and (2) increase the Club's income from Associate Member subscription.
- 9. Assuming year 2023 as the pioneer year of this new transfer initiative, there will be 264 Ordinary Members who would qualify and benefit from this.

# **HONORARY SECRETARY'S REPORT**

I am pleased to report that the Club has weathered through the Covid-19 pandemic and much of club life has returned to normal since April 2022. All of our facilities and amenities have reopened without social distancing restrictions. Our dining facilities are well patronized by members and banquets have started to return to the Club. An unexpected but pleasant surprise too was that our food takeaway service continued to be popular with members, with not much of a drop off even when unrestricted dining in was allowed. However, I still wish to remind members not to let your guard down where Covid-19 is concerned. Together, we can make our club a safe and welcoming place for all members to enjoy.

When the restrictions were relaxed, we were overwhelmed with the support from members eager to patronize our bars and restaurants. The management ramped up its recruitment process to replenish staffing numbers in the outlets as well as in the kitchen. I am aware of the delays that members have encountered during those initial months since reopening. The management has been hard at work, training the new recruits and also upskilling our existing service staff to the level of service that we expect, and I am thankful for your patience and understanding.

Our finances recorded a drop in our surplus for the financial year 2022 as compared to 2021. Much of that was attributed to the reduced wage subsidy that was received (from RM478k in 2021 to RM347k in 2022) as well as fewer entrance fee collected in 2022 (from RM1.2mil in 2021 to RM800k in 2022). The drop in collection of entrance fee was largely from the fewer numbers of junior members converting to Ordinary members (from 104 in 2021 to 38 in 2022). However, our restaurant and bar operations have improved significantly to offset the loss in income. The Club has also been affected by the increase in the minimum wage rate, which rose from RM1200 to RM1500. This came into effect in May 2022.

And reluctantly, the Management Committee has had to adjust our food and beverage prices in 2022 to tackle rising costs of sales. Just about everything has gotten more expensive, from everyday essentials like cooking oil to premium items like beef. We have been wary of keeping our new prices affordable and competitive, and are confident in the value-for-quality proposition of our food and beverage offerings.

Finally, I am at the sunset of my term serving as the Honorary Secretary. I am grateful to the entire Management Committee, all the sub-committees, advisors, the General Manager and his team, as well as you the members, for your steadfast support throughout the trying term dealing with the Covid-19 pandemic. Thank you.

The Management Committee are also responsible for such internal control as the Management Committee determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements of the Club that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements of the Club, the Management Committee are responsible for assessing the Club's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Management Committee either intend to liquidate the Club or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

### Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements of the Club as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with approved standards on auditing in Malaysia and International Standards on Auditing will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with approved standards on auditing in Malaysia and International Standards on Auditing, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:-

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements of the Club, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. 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# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

# 1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The principal objective of The Sarawak Club ("the Club") is to promote and carry on social and sporting activities.

The registered office and principal place of business of the Club is located at Jalan Taman Budaya, 93000 Kuching, Sarawak.

The financial statements of the Club were authorised for issue by the members of the Management Committee in accordance with a resolution of the members of the Management Committee on 29 MARCH 2023.

## 2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

The financial statements of the Club have been prepared under the historical cost convention and modified to include other bases of valuation as disclosed in other sections under significant accounting policies, and in compliance with Malaysian Private Entities Reporting Standard ("MPERS").

Management has used estimates and assumptions in measuring the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the end of the reporting period and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Judgement and assumptions are applied in the measurement, and hence, the actual results may not coincide with the reported amounts.

# 3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### 3.1 REVENUE RECOGNITION

Revenue represents membership subscriptions, entrance fees, surcharges and revenue generated from the activities of the Club.

Sales of goods and services rendered are recognised upon delivery of products and when the risks and rewards of ownership have passed to the members. Sales represent gross invoiced value of goods sold and services rendered net of trade discounts.

Interest income is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the interest rate applicable.

### 3.2 TAX ASSETS AND TAX LIABILITIES

A current tax for current and prior periods, to the extent unpaid, is recognised as a current tax liability. If the amount already paid in respect of current and prior periods exceeds the amount due for those periods, the excess is recognised as a current tax asset. A current tax liability or asset is measured at the amount the Club expects to pay or recover using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the reporting date.

A deferred tax liability is recognised for all taxable temporary differences, except to the extent that the deferred tax liability arises from: (a) the initial recognition of goodwill; or (b) the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction which is not a business combination and at the time of the transaction, affects neither accounting profit nor taxable profit or tax loss. The exceptions for initial recognition differences include items of property, plant and equipment that do not qualify for capital allowances and acquired intangible assets that are not deductible for tax purposes.

A deferred tax asset is recognised for all deductible temporary differences to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary difference can be utilised, unless the deferred tax asset arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and at the time of the transaction, affect neither accounting profit nor taxable profit or tax loss. The exceptions for the initial recognition differences include non-taxable government grants received and reinvestment allowances and investment tax allowances on qualifying property, plant and equipment.

A deferred tax asset is recognised for the carry-forward of unused tax losses and unused tax credits to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profit will be available against which the unused tax losses and unused tax credits can be utilised. Unused tax credits do not include unabsorbed reinvestment allowances and unabsorbed investment tax allowances because the Club treats these as part of initial recognition differences.

Deferred taxes are measured using tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the end of the reporting period. The measurement of deferred taxes reflect the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Club expects, at the end of the reporting period, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets or liabilities.

At the end of each reporting period, the carrying amount of a deferred tax asset is reviewed, and is reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow the benefit of a part or all of that deferred tax asset to be utilised. Any such reduction will be reversed to the extent that it becomes probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available.

A current or deferred tax is recognised as income or expense in profit or loss for the period. For items recognised directly in equity, the related tax effect is also recognised directly in equity.

#### 3.3 PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses, if any.

City club's freehold land has an unlimited useful life and therefore is not amortised.

All other property, plant and equipment are depreciated on a straight line method to their residual values at rates based on the estimated useful lives of the various assets.

The estimated useful lives are as follows:-

Short leasehold land	Over the remaining leasehold period
Buildings	30 to 50 years
Swimming pools	50 years
Tennis courts	30 years
Machineries	10 years
Furniture, fittings and equipment	2 to 10 years

Upon the disposal of an item of property, plant or equipment, the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the net carrying amount is recognised in the income statement.

### 3.4. INVESTMENT PROPERTIES

The Club recognises a land, building (including a floor of a building), or both land and building, including property under construction, as investment properties if it is held for capital appreciation, rental income or both. Investment properties are recorded at cost on initial recognition. Cost of investment properties comprises purchase price plus all directly attributable costs incurred to bring the property to its present location and condition intended for use as investment properties. Cost of self-constructed investment properties comprises all direct and indirect construction costs but exclude internal profits.

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, items of equipment that are irremovable and items that are physically attached to a building, such as lifts, elevators, electrical system and air-conditioning system, are treated as an integral part of the property. The Club uses the fair value model to measure investment properties after initial recognition if the fair value can be measured reliably without undue cost or effort. Any changes in the fair value of investment properties are recognised in profit or loss in the year in which they arise.

If a reliable measure of fair value is not available without undue cost or effort for an item of investment property subsequently, the investment properties are measured at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses until a reliable measure of fair value becomes available. In case of investment properties that had been previously accounted for using the fair value model, the carrying amount of the investment properties on that date becomes its cost.

### 3.4 INVESTMENT PROPERTIES (CONT'D)

Depreciation on investment properties is charged to profit or loss on a straight-line method to write off the depreciable amount of the assets over their estimated useful lives. The principal annual rates used for this purposes are:-

Short leasehold land	53 to 60 years
Building	50 years
Golf course	50 years
Swimming pool	50 years

The depreciation method, useful lives and residual values will be reviewed if there is a significant change since the last annual reporting date in the pattern by which the Club expects to consume the investment property's future economic benefits. Any changes are accounted for as a change in accounting estimate.

Any gain or loss arising from the disposal of investment properties is recognised in profit or loss.

### 3.5 IMPAIRMENT OF NON-FINANCIAL ASSETS

An impairment loss arises when the carrying amount of a Club's asset exceeds its recoverable amount.

At the end of each reporting period date, the Club assesses whether there is any indication that a stand-alone asset or a cash-generating unit may be impaired by using external and internal sources of information. If any such indication exists, the Club estimates the recoverable amount of the asset or cash-generating unit.

The recoverable amount of an asset or a cash-generating unit is the higher of its fair value less costs to sell and the value in use.

For an asset measured on a cost-based model, any impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

The Club reassesses the recoverable amount of an impaired asset or a cash-generating unit if there is any indication that an impairment loss recognised previously may have reversed. Any reversal of impairment loss for an asset carried at a cost-based model is recognised in profit or loss, subject to the limit that the revised carrying amount does not exceed the amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised previously.

### 3.6. INVENTORIES

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of food and beverages is determined on the weighted average method and other inventories are determined on "first-in, first-out" basis. The cost of inventories comprises the original purchase price plus cost incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location. Net realisable value represents the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less selling and distribution costs.

### 3.7 FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

### (a) Initial Recognition and Measurement

The Club recognises a financial asset or a financial liability in the statement of financial position when, and only when, it becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial assets and financial liabilities are measured at fair value which is generally the transaction price, plus transaction costs if the financial asset or financial liability is not measured at fair value through profit or loss. For instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss when incurred.

### (b) Derecognition of Financial Instruments

A financial asset is derecognised when, and only when, the contractual rights to receive the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or when the Club transfers the contractual rights to receive cash flows of the financial asset, including circumstances when the Club acts only as a collecting agent of the transferee, and retains no significant risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset or no continuing involvement in the control of the financial asset transferred.

A financial liability is derecognised when, and only when, it is legally extinguished, which is either when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expires. A substantial modification of the terms of an existing financial liability is accounted for as an extinguishment of the original financial liability and the recognition of a new financial liability.

### (c) Subsequent Measurement of Financial Assets

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, the Club classifies financial assets into two categories, namely: (i) financial assets at fair value through profit or loss, and (ii) financial assets at amortised cost.

Other than financial assets measured at fair value through profit or loss, all other financial assets are subject to review for impairment in accordance with Note 3.7(f).

### (d) Subsequent Measurement of Financial Liabilities

After initial recognition, all financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

### (e) Recognition of Gains and Losses

Fair value changes of financial assets and financial liabilities classified as at fair value through profit or loss are recognised in profit or loss when they arise.

For financial assets and financial liabilities carried at amortised cost, a gain or loss is recognised in profit or loss only when the financial asset or financial liability is derecognised or impaired, and through the amortisation process of the instrument.

### 3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

### 3.7 FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS (CONT'D)

### (f) Impairment and Uncollectibility of Financial Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the Club examines whether there is any objective evidence that a financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired. Evidences of trigger loss events include: (i) significant difficulty of the issuer or obligor; (ii) a breach of contract, such as a default or delinquency in interest or principal payments; (iii) granting exceptional concession to a customer; (iv) it is probable that a customer will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; (v) the disappearance of an active market for that financial asset because of financial difficulties; or (vi) any observable market data indicating that there may be a measurable decrease in the estimated future cash flows from a group of financial assets.

For short-term trade and other receivables, where the effect of discounting is immaterial, impairment loss is tested for each individually significant receivable wherever there is any indication of impairment. Individually significant receivables for which no impairment loss is recognised are grouped together with all other receivables by classes based on credit risk characteristics and aged according to their past due periods. A collective allowance is estimated for a class group based on the Club's experience of loss ratio in each class, taking into consideration current market conditions.

### 3.8 PROVISIONS

The Club recognises a liability as a provision if the outflows required to settle the liability are uncertain in timing or amount.

A provision is recognised when the Club has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of a past event, and of which the outflows of resources on settlement are probable and reliable estimate of the amount can be made. No provision is recognised if these conditions are not met.

A provision is measured at the best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period.

### 3.9 CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

The Club adopts the indirect method in the preparation of the cash flow statement.

Cash equivalents are short-term, highly liquid investments with maturities of three months or less from the date of acquisition and are readily convertible to cash with insignificant risks of changes in value.

### 3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT'D)

### 3.10 EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

The Club recognises a liability when an employee has provided service in exchange for employee benefits to be paid in the future and an expense when the Club consumes the economic benefits arising from service provided by an employee in exchange for employee benefits.

### (a) Short-term Benefits

Wages and salaries are accrued and paid on a monthly basis and are recognised as an expense, unless they relate to cost of producing inventories or other assets.

### (b) Post-Employment Benefits - Defined Contribution Plans

The Club makes statutory contributions to approved provident funds and the contributions made are charged to profit or loss in the period to which they relate. When the contributions have been paid, the Club has no further payment obligations.

### 4. CRITICAL JUDGEMENTS AND ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

### 4.1 ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

The measurement of some assets and liabilities requires management to use estimates based on various observable inputs and other assumptions. The areas or items that are subject to significant estimation uncertainties of the Club are:

### (a) Measurement of a Provision

The Club uses a "best estimate" as the basis for measuring a provision. Management evaluates the estimates based on the Club's historical experiences and other inputs or assumptions, current developments and future events that are reasonably possible under the particular circumstances.

### (b) Loss Allowances of Financial Assets

The Club recognises impairment losses for loans and receivables using the incurred loss model. Loans and receivables are categorised into credit risk classes and tested for impairment, using the Club's past experiences of loss statistics, ageing of past due amounts and current economic trends. The actual eventual losses may be different from the allowances made and these may affect the Club's financial position and results.

### 4. CRITICAL JUDGEMENTS AND ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY (CONT'D)

### 4.1 ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY (CONT'D)

### (c) Depreciation of Property, Plant and Equipment

The cost of an item of property, plant and equipment is depreciated on the straightline method. Estimates are applied in the selection of the depreciation method, the useful lives and the residual values. The actual consumption of the economic benefits of the property, plant and equipment may differ from the estimates applied and this may lead to a gain or loss on an eventual disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment.

### (d) Write-down of Inventories

Reviews are made periodically by management on damaged, obsolete and slowmoving inventories. These reviews require judgement and estimates. Possible changes in these estimates could result in revisions to the valuation of inventories.

### (e) Impairment of Property, Plant and Equipment and Investment Properties

The Club determines whether an item of its property, plant and equipment and investment properties is impaired by evaluating the extent to which the recoverable amount of the asset is less than its carrying amount. This evaluation is subject to changes such as market performance, economic and political situation of the country. A variety of methods is used to determine the recoverable amount, such as valuation reports and discounted cash flows.

### **CATERING MEMBER'S REPORT**

I am so pleased to welcome members back to the club. Members' appetite for dining in at the Club was apparent. From April 2022, we carefully reopened our F&B outlets to accept full capacity in compliance with the loosening of lockdown restrictions.

Surprisingly, the popularity of our takeaway service has continued. Takeaways levels were almost unchanged even though dining in took off from April 2022. Chef Tay has been instrumental creating many new dishes and pushing out promotion after promotion to entice members back. Comparing food sales in 2022 to 2019 which was the last full year before Covid-19, food sales grew from RM5.7 million to RM6.9 million. When comparing the monthly averages between April 2022 to December 2022 and the 12 months in 2019, the Main Hall generated 71% more sales, with a large proportion coming from takeaways.

I wish to apologise to members for the shortcomings that members had to endure during the initial months from April. The Club was short handed in the outlets as well as in the kitchen. Since the start of the lockdowns in 2020, the Management had not rehired to replace staff who had left and when the restrictions were lifted, the club was unable to hire the right people quickly enough. To cope with this, we implemented cut-off times for takeaway orders so that the kitchen can prioritise cooking for members dining in the clubhouse.

Another difficult decision that the Committee had to make was to adjust our food menu prices in all of our outlets. After the Main Hall menu was adjusted in April 2022, it was Hornbill Restaurant's turn in July 2022. The Committee has tried to keep the price revisions minimal to offset rising cost of raw materials and rising operational costs. Between 2021 and 2022, food costs went from 59.5% to 55.7% and equally, gross surplus margin improved from 55.7% to 57.3% We are confident that our food offerings remain affordable and good value when compared to elsewhere in town, plus of the quality that members have come to expect from the Club.

After the AGM 2022, we have also completed the upgrading of the partition system inside the Hornbill Restaurant by early November. The Hornbill Restaurant had to be closed twice for a week each time while the works were being carried out from mid-October. I thank the members for your patience and understanding. And timing was key with the Hornbill Restaurant in high demand from November 2022 till February 2023.

By and large, our food operations have resumed in earnest. Remember to stay safe; use common sense when gathering with family and friends. I wish all members the very best and I hope the Club continues to excel in bringing you a dining experience to remember.

Finally, my sincere thanks to my sub-committee members whom I have been able to rely on for ideas and support throughout this incredibly challenging term.

In October 2022, our very own Bar Executive Mr. Richard Jugie representing The Sarawak Club and East Malaysia, was crowned as Malaysia's Guinness Perfect Pour 2022 Champion in an event held in Petaling Jaya. This was his first national level accolade and what the Club hopes will be the first of many more to come. Congratulations!

As I bow out as Bar Member, I wish to thank my young sub-committee and the management team who have backed me up throughout the term. They have injected ideas and assisted to bring the various events to live.

### **HOUSE MEMBER'S REPORT**

I am pleased to share that the House Sub-Committee has undertaken several projects over the past year with the aim of improving the Club's facilities.

After several years of trials with two separate systems, the Club finally opted for the license plate recognition parking system in April 2022. The system takes advantage of improvements in video recognition software in reading car license plates and it has an accuracy rate of almost 99%. The system also does away with the tapping in with your membership card, and this coupled with guests being not required to stop for pre-payment before entering the carpark has greatly sped up ingress. Since the initial installation, the management has been updating its database of members' vehicle numbers and I believe the system is now generally functioning smoothly and reliably.

We have also attempted to address the issue of roof leaks in the clubhouse. After consulting with several roofing contractors, we proceeded to replace the roof cappings, which was believed to be the main source of the leaks. The works were completed in mid-December and from our observations, the known roof leaks (in the Main Hall and the Multi-Purpose Hall being the two most problematic areas) appear to have been resolved.

Another project of note was the upgrading of our electric switchgear. The Management had observed that power trips were occurring more frequently during peak usage and this was very disruptive to operations. We had the hardware upgraded to cater for greater loading and this has addressed the underlying problems.

Also in November 2022, the children's outdoor playground flooring was replaced with a new EPDM rubberized granule flooring system. The old flooring which was installed in 2015 had hardened and weathered over the years.

We have also been instructed by the Main Committee to come up with a masterplan proposal for possible club improvements and expansions moving forward. In that respect, we have worked diligently with the management team and the consultant architect to formulate a masterplan which the Main Committee intends to put up to the members for consideration.

As I will be coming to the end of my term as House Member, I would just like to say that it has been a privilege for me to serve and I thank everyone, the President, other members of the Committee, the GM and his management team, my fellow sub-committee members, all Club members and staff for the support, encouragement, patience and understanding that was afforded to me during my entire tenure.

The Management has also been eager to bring back the various activities which members have come to enjoy and some new ones, too. The Annual Swimming Gala made a welcome splash, and the Family Day was a great day out for our members, and especially for the young ones. The Kids Halloween Party was scarily popular with more than 50 children coming in their scariest costumes. The year-end New Year Eve bash made for a spectacular closing to the year and was the much needed buzz heading into 2023.

We have been recruiting new service staff and kitchen staff to cope with the return to full capacity operations. Service training is ongoing for the newcomers as well as for the senior staff to equip them with the necessary skills and confidence to serve the members. The Sarawak Club has gone from strength to strength and we look forward to even better days ahead.
